# Evaluate Effectiveness, Accessibility, and Quality of Personal and Population-Based Health Services

In the 2016 local public health system assessment, Essential Service #9 was ranked as having significant performance and 9<sup>th</sup> highest priority<sup>1</sup>.

#### **Description**

# Performance Significant

## Priority #9



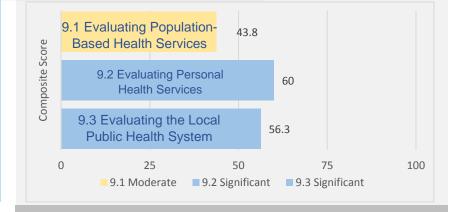
Participants were asked to consider the priority of each Essential Service and Model Standard to their local public health system. With an overall priority ranking score of **9 of 10**, this Essential Service is within the lower-ranking half of priorities.

#### **Model Standards**

Model Standards represent the major components or practice areas of the Essential Service. Standards 9.2 & 9.3 scored as **SIGNIFICANT** and standard 9.1 4 as **MODERATE activity**.

#### PERCEIVED SYSTEM STRENGTHS:

#### Several participants indicated that:

- There is an abundance of data on community health needs available to inform decision-making
- Community willingness to coordinate together to improve health outcomes is high

#### A few participants noted that:

• They are seeing a move from individual practice to group practice operations within the healthcare workforce

#### PERCEIVED SYSTEM WEAKNESSES:

#### Several participants indicated that:

- System wide coordination of health services is a challenge to individuals receiving comprehensive care
- A retiring healthcare professional workforce could lead to access to care issues

#### A few participants noted that:

- Individual practice to group practice operations may be due to technology cost, reimbursement changes and rising expenses
- Identifying tracking outcomes/follow up for some groups was reported as a challenge due to lack of consistency seeking care
- Personal health responsibility is critical to having improved health outcomes

 System-wide coordination of health outcome data, using integrated electronic health record systems
